## Meet Faux Paw, the Techno Cat



You might have already seen her on the Optimist website or in *The Optimist* magazine. Faux Paw is a cute, orange cat who is very curious about the internet. She is no ordinary cat though – her job is to educate children ages 6 to 10 about the dangers they may encounter while on the internet.

The Faux Paw program was developed by the iKeepSafe Coalition and specially tailored for the Optimist organization. The program features a PowerPoint presentation that includes a movie about Faux Paw's adventures on the internet, the script for the volunteer presenter, an internet safety quiz, coloring pages and discussion sheets. It can be used in schools, youth group meetings and even at Alpha Club events.

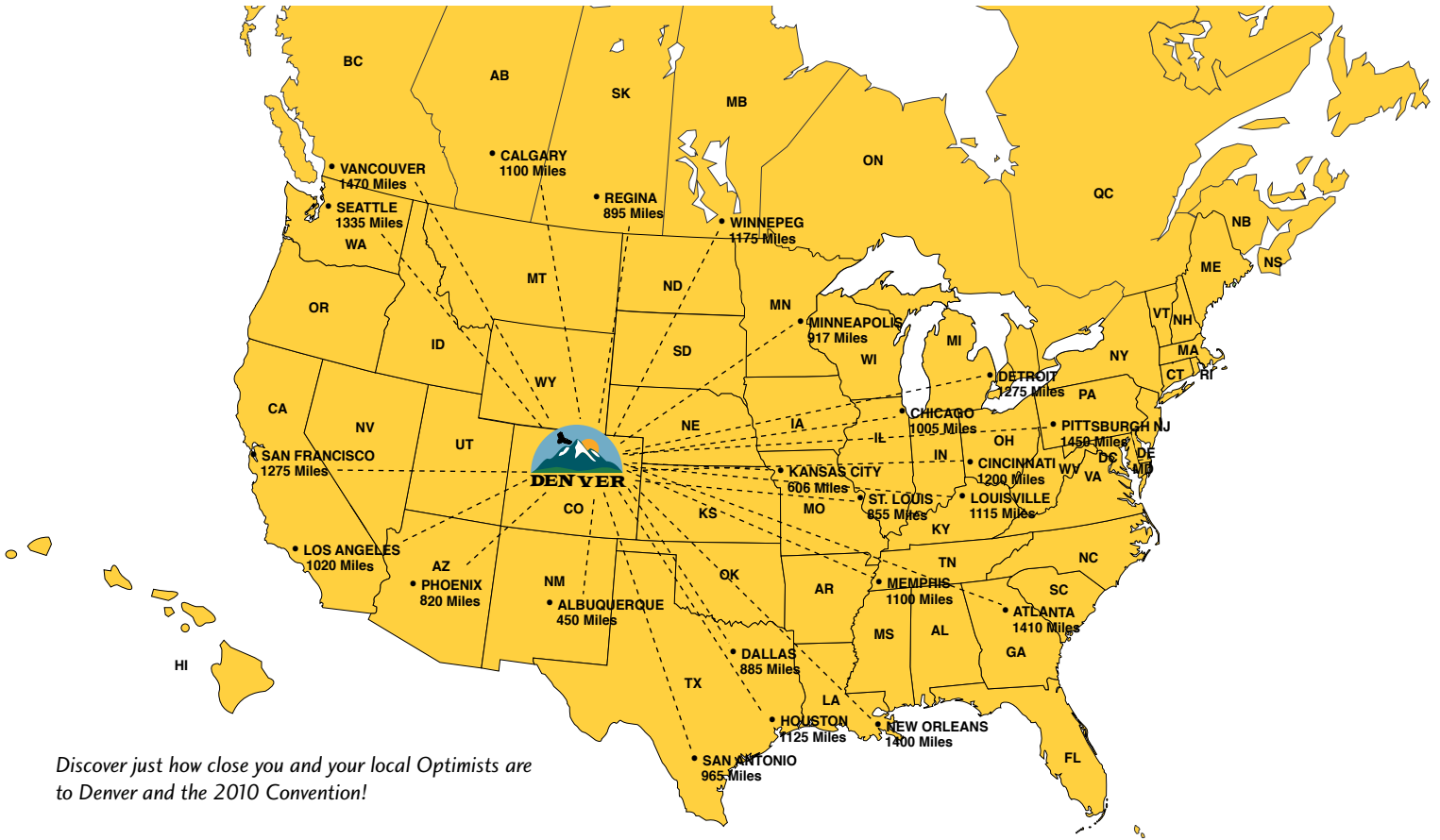
## RINGING IN A BIG YEAR

# Tournament of Champions Turns 5 with Big Weekend



Celebrating five years of the best of the best in junior golf, the Optimist International Tournament of Champions went off without a hitch in early November, thanks to a number of dedicated Optimist volunteers and determined young golfers.

One hundred young competitors battled it out on the Crooked Cat course at Orange County National Golf Center and Lodge in Winter Garden, Florida. All three playing fields finished with close scores as some of the most talented young golfers around aimed for the top spots.

Taking first place in the boys 16-18 division was a newcomer to Optimist Junior Golf. Jason Roets of Johannesburg, South Africa, finished three under par for the tournament and two strokes ahead of the playing field. Finishing in a tie for second were Hayden Squadrito of Oviedo, Florida, and Joshua Lee of Orange Park, Florida. Just one stroke back and rounding out the top four in the oldest boys division was Stephane Dubois of Brantford, Ontario.

Longtime Optimist participant Clancy Waugh of North Palm Beach, Florida, topped the boys 14-15 division. The championship comes a year after Waugh competed in a sudden-death playoff and finished in second place at the 2008 event. Waugh earned this year's championship with two rounds of steady golf and finished one stroke ahead of the field. Coming in second was Sheldon Statkewicz of Mobile, Alabama. Finishing in a tie for third were Austin Eoff of Benton, Arkansas, and Evan Deroche of Key West, Florida.

Local golfer Nicole Quinn of Windermere, Florida, scored the low round both days to capture the girls 14-18 division title. Quinn, another familiar name in Optimist golf tournaments, finished one stroke ahead of second-place finisher Katie Petrino of Fayetteville, Arkansas. Finishing the tournament in a tie for third were Juliana Herrera of Weston, Florida, and Kailey Walsh of Boca Raton, Florida.

## Submit Your District's Top Community Service and Fundraising CPAs

Just two weeks remain before all District-level Community Projects Awards winners need to be submitted.

The District-winning CPA entries and the First Place Entry Form must be submitted to the Programs Department by December 15, 2009. Please remove the District evaluation sheets before sending the books to the International Office.

The District Entry Form was due to the International Office by October 20, 2009. This form should list the names and Club numbers of all submitting Clubs along with the categories in which they entered their CPA books. The form must be signed by the District Activities Chairperson and the District Governor. If your District has not yet submitted this form, please do so as soon as possible.

If District-winning books and all paperwork are not submitted by the December 15 deadline, the entries may not be judged at the international level.

## STICKING TO THE RULES

The Zone, Region and District minimum number of contestants rule will be strictly enforced this year in all of the Optimist scholarship contests.

For the Oratorical Contest, if a Zone, Region or District sponsors a separate gender contest, there must be at least six participants – three boys and three girls. Combined gender contests must have no fewer than three participants.

In the District Essay Contest, there must be a minimum of three contestants participating.

In the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, there must be a minimum of three students at the Zone-, Regional- and District-level competitions.

In cases where the minimum number of three contestants at the Zone- or Regional-level contest cannot be met, there are two options. Club winners may be sent directly on to the next level of the competition or Zone or Regional contests can be combined. This decision will be up to the discretion of the District Contest Chair and the District Governor.

There are no exceptions made at the District level. If these minimums are not met, Districts will not be eligible for scholarship funding.
