GREETINGS TO MY FELLOW OPTIMISTS, FAMILIES & FRIENDS,



We have reached the halfway point in the 2016-17 year: the "Year of the Honor Club!" Everyone has been working very hard to keep our Clubs strong, healthy, active and a valued part of our communities. That is the basic concept behind Honor Club – it helps us do what we do best as Optimists by keeping our Clubs strong, and permitting all of us to give back to our communities by serving our youth. By doing this, we also grow personally! All of this is what makes Optimists and Optimism so great!

We have some great happenings going on in the Optimist world:

- The Albuquerque International Convention is coming up and I hope you plan on attending! It is a great city to visit. The convention will offer many great Optimist training and personal development opportunities, as well as greeting old Optimist friends, and making new ones. Sharing and learning from each other is a great Optimist way to learn!
- The Optimist International World Oratorical Championships has completed its second year. The oratorical contest is Optimist International's longest running program – established in 1928. Including the preliminary round of contests from the Club, Zone and Districts, it is estimated that over 6,000 youth participated! In addition to the traditional oratorical contest, many Districts also run the Communication Contest for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing and serve even more youth. The essay contest has the same impact: serving more youth. From the Club level on up, it is estimated that some 5,000 youth participate. We can be proud as Optimists on the number of youth we serve each year through our programs.
- The Optimist Junior Golf Championships are about to begin for the year. After District qualifiers, some 700 youth will travel to Florida for the Championships. When looking at the qualifiers at the District levels, our youth golf tourney is the largest youth golf tournament in the world – close to 6,000 youth participate at all levels. This tournament has been ongoing since 1967!
- Junior Optimist International continues to thrive. We now have some 15,000 Members, led by a great Board of Directors and President. Junior Optimist International is our future! Junior Optimist International Members graduating from high school will now receive a complimentary one-year membership in a traditional Optimist Club or College Club! Reach out to the Junior Optimist Club in your area and invite graduating Members to join your Club!

- Our College Clubs are being revitalized. The Board has made changes to make it easier to be a College Member, and hopefully this will entice our College Members to join a traditional Club after college.
- We have added over 5,800 Members, 29 new Clubs and 44 Junior Optimist Clubs since October 1.
- The momentum from the "Year of the Honor Club" will keep us moving ahead with healthier and stronger Clubs. Remember when a Club achieves Honor Club status, it serves 100 more youth in the community being served, and that really is what we are all about as Optimists – serving more kids!

All the above bode well for the future of our great organization: doing what we do best to provide service to youth and communities. However, we have to be aware of one downside! Through March 31 based upon our overall net numbers, going forward there will be some 60,000 youth who will not get the service they need from an Optimist Club.

That sounds like a very big number, and in some ways, it is! Nevertheless, if every Cub adds just one Member, we move from a deficit of service to an increase of 12,000 more youth served. That has to be our goal – remember the "Power of One!" We each need Optimist to find their own replacement! In addition, each Honor Club represents 100 more youth being served. If 15% of our Clubs achieve Honor Club status, over 30,000 additional youth will be served!

We all need to work together in the next four months as we complete the "Year of the Honor Club." Youth, our future, need us and what we offer as Optimists more than ever. Using the "Power of One," we can turn a deficit of service to a positive number. And that is what we need to do as Optimists. Let's all work toward that goal, and be able to serve more youth, not fewer.

FORGING AHEAD WITH INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Optimist International Board of Directors approved a pilot program aimed at accelerating development of Optimist Clubs around the globe. The so-called "225/10 Program" created an affiliation fee of \$225 US per year and membership dues of \$10 per Member. The idea was to make it affordable for just about anyone to become associated with Optimist International.

Mamadou Gueye, the President of the Optimist Club of Dakar, Senegal writes: "I have realized that we cannot carry out transformational change in our community when there is no hope. So, I joined Optimist International in a bid to team up with likeminded people who attach the utmost importance to community work."

Mamadou's Optimist Club works toward rehabilitating a school library and is trying to address the issue of street begging by children.

"Only home-grown efforts can lead to sustainable wellbeing among our community. In this respect, Optimist International is a framework wherein we can harness our strengths and unlock our community members' full potential in an effort to create a better Senegal in a better world."





The Optimist Club in Senegal was the first to organize under the pilot program followed quickly by the Optimist Club of Bamako, Mali. Two new Clubs have organized in Ghana and another is planned later this year. Tema District Optimist Club President Emmanuel Kofi Dogbe reports his group got involved because of the philosophy of Optimist International.

"As volunteers joining an Optimist Club, we bring positive service in our community and provide a helping hand to the needy," said Dogbe.

Optimist Clubs continue to flourish in Uganda under the guidance of past Michigan Governor and International Development Ad Hoc committee member, Robert Schiller.

"What began as a Junior Optimist effort in 2003, has grown into a model international growth effort with five Junior Optimist International Clubs, and two more in development, and one adult Optimist Club, Kupsya Agents of Millennium Progress (KAMP), and two more adult Clubs in formation."

There are weekly, and sometimes daily, inquiries from people around the world who want to become part of the Optimist family. Uday Niraula is a University lecturer from Kathmandu, Nepal who reached out to Optimist International.

"We, a small group of like-minded friends, with our own effort are in small-scale social services with the motto of 'Let's do whatever we can do for a better society," said Niraula. "During our social interactions, the most worrying thing what we found is the people who are deeply pessimistic about the future. We concluded that the pessimism, particularly the pessimism in the youth, will hinder our society's development." Niraula and his like-minded friends began searching for supporting institutions in order to affiliate and discovered Optimist International, which he believes will allow his group in Nepal to combine the philosophy of Optimism with actions. The Optimist Club of Kathmandu plans to focus on empowering women.

New Club projects are underway around the globe in places like Costa Rica, Chad, India, Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica, and Guinea. They demonstrate that a year after the pilot project for international development began, a nearly century old service organization is still very relevant in the 21st century.

LEBANON OPTIMIST CLUB'S GIFT TO THE COMMUNITY

The Optimist Club of Lebanon, Oregon is a symbol of cooperation in drawing their community together, not once but twice. On September 13, 2016, the Club held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to donate an octagon-shaped gazebo to the city, the second such donation.

Twenty-five years ago, Bill Rauch, accountant, Dennis Clark, dentist, and Jim McDaniel, local leader, all representing the Optimist Club, agreed to manage funds and organize a project to construct a gazebo at Ralston Park. The community quickly rallied behind the project.

In 1991, the Optimist Club presented the Ralston Park gazebo to the City of Lebanon. The gazebo has become a prominent symbol for the community to hold activities such as Concerts in the Park, Christmas Tree Lighting, National Neighborhood Night Out, and countless weddings and celebrations. However, Ralston Park is limited to 50-100 people at an event.

In 2012, Rauch, McDaniel and Doug Phillips, President of the Optimist Club at the time, seized upon the idea that Lebanon could create new opportunities with a larger outdoor stage at Academy Square Park, near the city library and Senior Center. They took their vision to local engineer Shawn Turrentine. He accepted the role of project designer, and joined the Optimist Club. Phillips became the project manager.

Local businesses again stepped up to provide labor and equipment. To raise funds, the Optimist Club sold bricks which the purchaser could have their name, business, nonprofit, club, school, memorial to someone, or simply a famous saying, etched on the stone. The completed bricks are displayed on the floor of the 1,134 square foot gazebo.

The recent dedication ceremony was hosted by the city as a thank you to the many Optimist Members who worked on the project. Phillips read a long list of the local businesses who donated services and materials, whose contributions made it possible to complete the gazebo without any use of taxpayer money. The two-hundred citizens in attendance also enjoyed food and music, making it the first concert in the freshly completed stage.

Joining the festivities were Dick Disney, Past Governor of the Pacific Northwest District; Linda Disney, Past International Vice President of the West Coastal Region; Bruce Gilbertson, Governor-Elect of the Pacific Northwest District; and Fran Bounds, Lt. Governor of Pacific Northwest District -Zone 3. Many of the 100-plus Members of the Lebanon Optimist Club attended.

The project did not distract from the many areas the Club supports to encourage youth in the community. Though the completion took four years, the Optimist Club remained faithful in their commitment.

"We could have done it cheaper and quicker," Turrentine explained, "but I felt the steel and concrete were the best choice because of their low maintenance and it lasts longer than wood."

The Optimist Club had a dream and with the long wait being over, the gazebo now stands ready for the future.





RESPECT FOR LAW

The Optimist Club of Akron, Ohio, is the oldest, active Optimist Club in the Ohio District of Optimist International. After 94 years, we are still going strong.

For many years, our Respect for Law Program included honoring an officer of the Akron Police Department (APD) and a Fire/Medic of the Akron Fire Department (AFD). In 2006, we expanded it to include a Deputy from the Summit County Sheriff Department.

Once again, on April 4, 2017, we expanded our Respect for Law Program to include a K-9 Handler of the Year award. The first recipient was from the Akron Police Department. The honoree was Officer Alan Jones and his partner, Midnite.

At the presentation, in addition to the recipient, his wife and daughter, also attending were Chief James Nice of APD; Chief Clarence Tucker of AFD; Akron Deputy Mayor Charles Brown; Marilyn Keith, President of Akron City Counsel; 15 club members, three possible new members, Zone 3 Lt. Governor Dick Henson and his wife, Jan; six members of the Akron Fire Department and twenty three members of the Akron Police Department.

Officer Jones was told about the award six weeks prior to the event. He didn't actually believe it, as his fellow officers are always playing jokes on each other. When Officer Jones saw the article in the Akron Beacon Journal on Monday, April 3rd, he finally believed it was true.

At an Optimist Club luncheon, Officer Jones was honored and presented with a personal plaque and a larger one for the Akron Police Department. A Member of our Club, Lt. Cynthia Christman, who retired on March 31 after over 25 years of service with the APD, donated the larger plaque, which will hang on the wall of the Akron Police Department.



He was also given a gift certificate to a pet store for Midnite and a tin of assorted chocolates and nuts for the handler's family. Every year, we will add the name of the new recipient to the big plaque.

We are hoping more Clubs throughout Optimist International can adopt this program and expand their Respect for Law program.

We will be continuing with this program every year. There are many departments in Summit County with K-9 Handlers and partners. We want everyone to realize that K-9's are members of the law enforcement department. Treat them with respect. They might save a life and it could be yours.



The following is the recommendation from Akron Police Department Sgt. Chris Davis for the K-9 Officer of the Year:

"I recommend Officer Alan Jones for K-9 Optimist Officer of the Year for several different reasons. Officer Jones has shown true dedication to his position as a K-9 handler in the SNUD (Street Narcotic Uniform Detail) Unit for the last five years. Jones and his K-9 Midnite are a great team. Al has done numerous demonstrations with Midnite and is always enthusiastic and their presence at the various venues is a crowd pleaser. Al is always working to elevate his skills as a K-9 handler and it is evident when you watch him and Midnite in action. Al has always stayed in great shape which makes him an excellent representative for the K-9 unit. Al has been a member of the SNUD unit and the SWAT team for over 20 years. The position of K-9 handler requires a level of dedication that exceeds the normal demands of a typical police officer. Officer Jones has embraced that challenge since the day he started in the unit. Al's positive demeanor and enthusiasm for the job is emblematic of the values that the Akron Police Department strives for."



BATTLE BUDDIES

The Palmetto Optimist Club located in Sumter, South Carolina just proudly completed their 2nd edition of this unique event which combines health, physical fitness, and the Respect for Law program.

Nettie Bryant, the Club's Director of Physical Fitness and a former member of the United States Air Force, created "Battle Buddies." The idea she presented allowed members of law enforcement and emergency personnel to assist the kids in overcoming the obstacles on the course. The purpose of the program is to teach kids that law enforcement will help them later on in overcoming life's obstacles that cross their paths. Nettie organized the law enforcement and emergency volunteers.

After the first event, the Club decided that "Battle Buddies" would be held each Fall and Spring.

The President of the Club, Bonnie Sherbert, worked to organize the Club Members and duties, which

included registration, raffle tickets, concessions, and volunteer members at each obstacle. Bonnie's husband, Mike Sherbert, is quite skilled in woodworking and created most of the course's obstacles.

Over 120+ kids participated between the two "Battle Buddies" events and we were blessed to add 3 new Members and 17 kids who wanted to join our upcoming Junior Optimist Club.

SAFE Kids from Palmetto Tuomey were on hand to teach kids safety on bikes and much more. There was demonstrations in the Fall event which included martial arts, cheerleading, and more. Future events will also include gymnastics.

A drawing for a 3-day/2-night stay at the premium resort 'Camelot by the Sea' located in Myrtle Beach was raffled off. All proceeds from the event has been earmarked for scholarships offered by the Club in essay and oratorical contests.

Overall, the feedback was tremendous and we look forward to this bi-annual event.

SOCIAL, SERVICE AND YOUNG PROFESSIONALS GROUP AKA "CLUB WITHIN A CLUB"

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is a "Club within a Club"?

A "Club within a Club" is a group of at least 15 new Optimist Members who are added to your Club in order to expand service to your community. They are still Members of your Optimist Club, but they function somewhere outside the scope of your Club's traditional membership base and activities.

What are some examples?

Examples include:

- A morning or afternoon Club who adds 15 new Members by adding an evening meeting to accommodate community Members unable to meet during the day.
- A Club with an older membership base who brings in a group of young professionals or college students to bolster membership, help with existing projects, and bring new ideas and excitement.
- A Club who recruits a group of teachers or other school personnel to work directly with the school.
- A traditional Club who partners with a group of coaches to add sports program to their Club's activities.
- A group of Members who focuses solely on one project all year like a major town fair or childhood cancer. Think of them like an expanded committee.

The point of a "Club within a Club" is to get Optimist Club's to think "outside-the-box" in their membership recruitment and activities. There are unlimited possibilities!

How do I form one?

Look for any opportunities within your community. An opportunity could be a special project that needs to be accomplished or another volunteer group in your area to mutually benefit from a partnership with your Optimist Club. Consider your Club's current membership. Are there any groups in your community that you are failing to attract? Examples include younger people, teachers, men, women, etc. The most successful Optimist Clubs have diverse memberships reflecting a cross-section of all ages, genders, professions, and backgrounds existing in their communities. Why are these groups not joining your Club? What could you do to change that? A common example of an Optimist Club who fails to attract younger Members or working people because they meet in the morning or afternoon.

What is the cost?

There is no Charter fee. Clubs will be billed for the Members of the "Club within a Club" in the same manner in which they are billed for other Members. A regular, adult Member still pays the \$15.00 processing fee and full International and District dues. If they are Friends of Optimist, college Members, \$30 under 30, etc., they will be billed accordingly. Any class of Optimist Member may be included in a "Club within a Club." They will be included in your dues billing along with your other Members.





Does the "Club within a Club" have its own officers?

They may have *informal* officers to help conduct their meetings and business. The main Club's officers and Board of Directors are still the legally responsible party.

Can they open their own bank account?

Maybe. The "Club within a Club" does not have their own unique governmental filing information, which is required for nonprofits to open a bank account in most countries. You would need to ask your bank about the process of opening another account using the same governmental filing information.

Groups that wish to have their own officers and/ or bank account may be better off as a new, independent Optimist Club. (See below for more information.)

How does this differ from new Club building?

A "Club within a Club" is not fully autonomous to operate how it chooses. The main Club's Board of Directors is still legally responsible for the new group's activities and finances. This is great for groups who do not wish to worry about Club administration, officer elections, governmental filings, etc. Many groups wish to be autonomous. If a group wants to have their own legally responsible officers, bank accounts, etc., they should be formed as a new Club. If you are unsure if a group should be a new Club or a "Club within a Club," call the Membership Department at 800-500-8130 ext. 226.

When did this start?

This is something your Optimist Club has always been able to do. You are autonomous to decide whom you recruit, when you meet, and what projects you do. The only difference is that now there is a New Club Building award credit and Builder of Excellence award tied to expanding your Club as of the 2016-17 Optimist year. The new group may also receive a roll-up Creed banner, if desired.

When does it end?

This is not an incentive with a set end date. We plan to continue to award New Club Building credits as long as Clubs are participating in this incentive. Expanding and diversifying our Clubs is critical for long-term viability.

My Club just had a successful membership recruitment drive and added 15 Members. Do we receive credit for a "Club within a Club?"

While this is a great accomplishment, it is not a "Club within a Club" unless these 15 Members are doing something differently than your Club's traditional activities.

If the "Club within a Club" eventually decides it should become its own Optimist Club, will they be able to?

Yes.

If they do break off to form their own Club, will the original Club be hurt for awards purposes?

No.

Once we have identified and recruited our 15 Members, how do we notify Optimist International?

All 15 Members must be added on the same day. You may add the Members yourself online at optimistleaders.org. After the 15 Members have been added, notify Optimist International that you have done so at the contact information at the bottom of this page. You may also send the full list of names and contact information to Optimist International to add the new Members to your Club's roster for you.


ARE YOU OPTIMIST STRONG?

SAN DIEGO JUNIOR OPTIMIST **PONY SCOUTS**





Spread Relief

The Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation is proud to be a partner of the Canadian Optimist Clubs in their effort to promote and encourage Canadian youth. We developed programs to help these Clubs make their mark and succeed in helping their community.

The Outsourcing Program helps the Clubs optimize their fundraising efforts by providing charitable tax receipts to donors and by using Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation resources, like the online donations. Each quarter, \$500 Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation Club Grants are remitted to Canadian Clubs in order to help them develop community projects that benefit Canadian children at large. You may find more information on these programs on our website.

And now, there is the **Spread Relief** program.

Last July, the Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation Board of Directors announced a moratorium on the Childhood Cancer Campaign. The objective was to enlarge that wellknown and well-loved program in order to help more kids and their families across the country.

The always-growing number of Clubs and Members were asking for a way to help kids with a range of health issues. Physical disabilities generate high treatment costs for a family. Every community has special needs and asking the Optimists for some help is often the first thing that comes in mind when in need of support. Unfortunately, we were not able to help the Clubs in helping children with mental health problems, cystic fibrosis or heart diseases, for example, as much as we would have liked to. Our health program was very narrowly focused.

The Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation has broadened its program to assist more children and families dealing with more diverse health issues. The mission will include projects focused on assisting children and families dealing with more mental and physical health issues, or promoting and raising awareness of the benefits of a healthy lifestyle to inspire entire communities.

Starting on October 1st 2017, the **Spread Relief** program will:

- Develop a template for Clubs to use to identify and assess the needs in the community;
- Through a committee, select from all the project submissions those that exemplify this program;
- Give seed money to the chosen projects, based on funds available and the Club's needs;
- Share the projects on the Foundation's platforms to promote the program's success and inspire other Clubs.

The closer you are to a community, the more you know their needs. We therefore think Optimist Members and Clubs are well placed to know how they could serve youth in their own community. Optimist Members are wellknown for their active work and we have committed to help them. The Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation is ready to **Spread Relief** from coast to coast. **Are you?**



A TRUE STORY OF FLOURISHING YOUTH

Imagine a large garden. To have magnificent flowers, you need to work the earth, sow and tend your seeds. You need to water to hydrate the plant and soil, and sunlight to caress their petals. Some people claim that they grow bigger and prettier if you talk to them.

An Optimist family functions exactly the same way. The children are the flowers; the water and the sun are the examples shown by the parents, and even the grandparents.

Nina Strickland, President of the Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation, and her husband Fred, have sown Optimism in their family. The Optimist culture has taken root for three generations. Fred Strickland's involvement began in 1980, when he joined the Optimist Club of Moore in Southwest Ontario. Involved in Christmas activities and youth golf tournaments in his Club, his passion resulted in him serving on Club and District levels, and holding a Chair position on an International committee. His Optimism spread to his wife, who was involved informally during a time when only men were admitted as Optimist Members.

In 1990, Nina Strickland finally became an Optimist Member, and performed every important role in her Club, District, and various International committees. Her involvement reached its peak when she was appointed President of the Canadian Children's Optimist Foundation, a first for a woman. Denise Nacev, their daughter, often claims that she cannot remember a time without Optimism in her life. It is therefore not surprising that she has been active along with her parents since she was ten years old, in her parents' Club activities and with her Junior Optimist Club. She is now an Optimist Member and has served at the Club, District and International level.

Denise and her husband, Tony, have raised two boys, Mathew and Andrew. Both are Junior Optimist Members who have continued their grandparents' tradition within their local Junior Optimist Club and in their District.

If you ask them why they continue to cultivate their "Optimism garden," they would answer that they receive as much as they give. Fred and Nina have had the opportunity to influence the lives of many youth through the years. Denise has learned many leadership skills and overcome a fear of public speaking. Andrew, who is on the Autism Spectrum, has gained confidence, friendships, and leadership skills. Mathew is sharpening his natural leadership abilities and enjoys mentoring younger Optimist Members.

With three generations volunteering at the Optimist Club, District and International levels, we can expect to continue to see youth flourishing. Are you cultivating your garden?
