NOW events can take many forms. It could be a happy hour, a Saturday brunch, or a wine and cheese party. Many Clubs have held successful NOW events, so if your Club needs help planning one, just ask around. Ask your District Membership Chair, or find a Club nearby that has held one. Your District is full of great resources to help you plan a NOW event.

Just remember: don't wait to hold your NOW event. Do it right

# **District Essay Winners Deadline**

District Essay winners must be submitted to Optimist International by April 15. The District Entry Form, Winner's Information Form, a copy of the essay and the winner's birth certificate or passport must be sent to the Programs Department.

# **District Oratorical** Winners Deadline

The deadline to submit District Oratorical winners is May 15. The District Entry Form, Winner's Information Form, Regional Winner's Information Form, a copy of the speech, and the birth certificate or passport must be submitted for each of the winners. The Student Evaluation Form is also required.

# **CCDHH Winners** Deadline

The District CCDHH chair must submit the District Entry Form, Winner's Information Form, a copy of the speech and an audiogram by June 15.

# Optimists Team with Denver Broncos Player to Promote Reading Among Kids

#### The Monaco South Optimist Club in Denver embraces projects that further the education of children. It was natural for the Club to collaborate with a Denver Broncos football player's program promoting reading among underprivileged students in grades K-3.

The Club collected more than 3,000 books and helped Denver Bronco David Bruton distribute the books at the Club's annual Thanksgiving Dinner at the Boys and Girls Club of Metro Denver. Each of the 750 or so children at the dinner received three books, along with a card bearing the Optimist Creed and a sticker from Bruton encouraging the children to read.

The David Bruton Jr. Foundation and Bruton Books seek to help low-income children in grades K-3 become strong readers through tutoring and by providing books to underfunded schools, libraries and classrooms.

Monaco South Member Steve Kady saw a video about Bruton's work and reached out to the organization to seek his participation in the longstanding dinner.

"That's when I organized the book drive so we could give each of the kids a book," Kady explained. "The Club conducted the drive, placing collection boxes in each of the ten schools it serves through its Super Citizen program. Word got out and donations started pouring in."

The Thanksgiving Dinner is named after the late Bill Walters, its long-term Club chair for the dinner, and it feeds children bused in from a center around the Denver metro area. Club Members serve food in a long serving line that lets them interact with the kids and in some cases, their families.

Bruton spoke to the kids before they went into the gymnasium for dinner.

"His interaction was fantastic," Kady said. "The children took to him instantly. He informed them of how important it is for them to read books; his smile and gentleness is an instant attraction."

Kady said collecting and sorting the books in one month took some serious effort. He had the support of his wife Susan and various family members and Optimists. Books were donated by the Englewood Public Library and the Denver Public Library, and a manager of a local Verizon store donated 800 bags to the cause.

# Marana-Foothills **Optimist Club of Tucson: Dispose-A-Med**

The Marana-Foothills Optimist Club of Tucson, Arizona are "Optimists in Action" all year long. A project that keeps the Club busy is the community Dispose-A-Med event. The Club has successfully participated in the event for four years. Working with the Marana Arizona Police Department, the Primavera Foundation in Tucson, the Arizona Youth Partnership and Target, the Club regularly participates in Dispose-A-Med.

Dispose A Med is comprised of concerned citizens like yourself focused on minimizing the abuse of prescription medications amongst teens and preventing accidental drug poisonings of children and the elderly. Unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply. Proper disposal of unused drugs saves lives and protects our environment. Bring any unused or expired prescriptions, over-the-counter and/or veterinarian medications and they will be properly disposed of.

The Marana Police Department schedules the events for the entire year. The Dispose-A-Med collections are on the second Saturday of every even numbered month for two hours. Scheduling the events for the entire year allows the Club Dispose-A-Med Chairperson, Nancy Lyngby, to have one flyer made with the time, the location and all the dates. Nancy, other volunteers in the Club, and the Marana Police Department work with the area pharmacies, doctors' offices, community bulletin boards, and the Town of Marana and Marana Police Department websites to post the information. Many of the local pharmacies are so very glad to have the information on hand.

The Target store provides a protected space, which is very appreciated in the hot Tucson summer months. Target always provides tables, chairs, and during the cold months, coffee.

The Primavera Foundation provides pathways out of poverty through safe, affordable housing, workforce development and neighborhood revitalization. For the Dispose-A-Med event, the Primavera Foundation picks up the empty prescription containers to use to dispense shampoo, soap, sunscreen and other lotions to their clients. They pick up the empty containers after the event and clean the containers for re-use.

Arizona Youth Partnership mission is to partner with communities to cultivate healthy foundations for youth and promote strong families. Their role in the Dispose-A-Med event is to provide medicine lock boxes to distribute to families.

The Marana Police Department liaison, Officer Kevin Litton, provides the law enforcement supervision, the disposal of collection containers, and the disposal of the drugs. The Marana Police Department volunteers, also known as VIPS, work with the Club Members to set up the event, take control of the drugs, sort the empty containers, mark out any identifying information on the containers and cleanup after the event.

The average amount collected is about 200 lbs. at each event. During the four Dispose-A-Med events in 2015, over 1100 pounds of drugs were collected. Not only does this keep the drugs out of our ecosystem, it keeps them out of the hands of

THE DEVASTATION IN DOMINICA WREAKED BY TROPICAL STORM ERIKA WAS WELL DOCUMENTED AND THE PLEAS FOR ASSISTANCE WERE HEARD ALL OVER THE WORLD, AND MOST DEFINITELY IN BARBADOS.

The Optimist Club of Barbados, Bridgetown along with the Harrison College Junior Optimist Octagon Club (JOOI) responded to the call by hosting a fundraising back in time party.

As the Christmas season drew closer, it was evident that many children in Dominica would have a very different Christmas due to the ongoing efforts to bring the country back to a state of normalcy.

Zahidha James, Secretary of the Bridgetown Club and a Dominican attorney practicing in Barbados, was asked by Dr. Carol Jacobs, President of the Club, to identify the best way in which the funds raised could be used to help children in Dominica.

She identified the annual children's Christmas party which had been held in the village of Marigot for the past 25 years and which was indeed in jeopardy of being cancelled. She knew that it provided the only gift and party many of the children in this village would enjoy. The efforts of the Optimist Club of Barbados, Bridgetown and the Harrison College JOOI Club made it possible for the party to be held and for every child to receive a gift.

Zahidha James said, "It was very fulfilling to see the excitement on the faces of the 300 children. as they waited patiently to receive their gifts."

President Dr. Carol Jacobs expressed her delight at the fact that the Clubs could make such a meaningful impact on the lives of the children and reiterated that the motto "Friend of Youth" was indeed the driving force behind all projects undertaken in the name of the Optimist movement. She added, "It was particularly pleasing to see the Harrison College JOOI Club join forces with our Club to make this project a reality. They raised the money by having a cake sale, and through other activities at their school."

The Optimist Club of Barbados, Bridgetown is the first Optimist Club formed in Barbados in 1992 and is now joined by five other Clubs on the island, and 79 in the Caribbean.



The Optimist Club of Garner in North Carolina is the sponsor of a successful youth basketball league that will begin its 47th consecutive season this spring. More than 10,000 kids have played in the league since the Club recognized a need in its community. Opportunities, such as the league, are what has allowed the Club of about 90 Members to remain vital in a community of about 25,000 residents.

The Club recently made a \$7,000 donation for cancer research and will sponsor youth baseball and softball teams along with a Youth Essay Contest in the spring. The Club will also present nine \$1,000 scholarships to area high school graduates. Not bad for a Club that came close to folding in 1978! The group had drifted away from its intent of being a "Friend of Youth."

"We weren't doing anything except meeting," recalled Nick Sarrocco, a founding Member. Sarrocco said some of the Members asked him about being President the next year and he told them he was leaving the Club. He wanted to be a part of something that was making a difference. Sarrocco changed his mind and agreed to be President. In one day, Elwood King, Bill Weathersbee and Sarrocco contacted all 30 Optimist Club Members and asked if they wanted to continue to meet or stop. Sixteen men, including new President Sarrocco, signed on and agreed to give it at least a year.

"We knew we had to change if we wanted the Club to survive." Sarrocco said. "We started being more involved in the community and inviting new Members."

Elwood King said the goal of helping youth was too important to abandon.

# "I always felt that we had to have the Club to help our kids," King said. "Something would be missing without it."

By the end of the following year, the Club had rebounded with an active membership of over 100, had purchased eight acres of land for a clubhouse, and acquired a house to be moved to the land. The old cinderblock house is still there, but it is now part of a 4,600 square foot clubhouse.

"One of the things we did was recognize the men who were doing positive things for the Club," King said. "We improved our meetings, got more involved in the community and reached out to the community. Many people did a lot of work to get the Club turned around. With the identity crisis resolved, the Club hasn't looked back and has remained focused on helping children."

"Our mission is to help young people." Bob Harvin said. "That's what we do. It is hard not to get emotional when I talk about it, but the whole thing comes back to helping children."

The Club does many projects for the kids and the community, but it is best known for the basketball league. The league doesn't have a structure to teach citizenship and responsibility, but players learn about those character traits, and others, in subtle ways.

Attorney Brian Meacham, a former player on the University of North Carolina junior varsity basketball team for two years, said the league helped him in ways that are difficult to articulate. He loved playing the game, but said his most lasting memories in the league involved adults.

"To me, that was one of the biggest things," he said. "I read recently that it is important for children to learn how to relate to adults outside their family. That is something the league did for me. I got to know men and see how they related to each other, as well as with us. I still have relationships with the men who coached me and who were involved in the program."

Dr. Shaun Tyrance, another former player, was a four-year letterman as a football guarterback at Davidson College. He understands how the league helped him in his development as a person. The league was the first time he thought seriously about sports. He is now a sports psychologist who works with college and professional athletic teams. He remembers watching a diverse community coming together at the games on Saturday morning.

"There were all these kids from different neighborhoods and we were playing together, and our families were sitting together. That's not always the case in society," Tyrance said.

Tyrance, who has written two books on transitioning from adolescence to adulthood, said the league helped him learn how to compete. He says it was the first time his athletic ability had been recognized.

Working hard and doing his best came naturally for Pat Watkins, who would one day play in Major League Baseball for the Cincinnati Reds and Colorado Rockies.

"The Optimist basketball league was my first team," he recalled. "I remember picking out my shoes and buying sweat bands. All of the teams had different color jerseys. I'd go to the games early and watch my friends play. I realized success requires effort and teamwork is very important. I used to dribble and shoot all the time - basketball was my game. And when I got on a team and played in games, I could see that working together could help make you a better player. I never forgot that."

Jeremy Woodard, who recently starred in the Broadway musical "Rock of Ages," has not forgotten his Optimist basketball league days either. He has performed at the *Tony Awards*, been named an outstanding alumnus of East Carolina and received standing ovations from thousands of audiences. But he will never forget winning an Optimist basketball league title.

"We won the title," Woodard said. "It may be the only championship I've been a part of. It was a big thing. When I think of my biggest thrills that is one of them. The league was one of the best things about growing up in Garner. I just hope the kids have as much fun as I did."

It is difficult for the Optimists who started the league to realize the boys who gathered 47 years ago in a 1920's-era gym to play the first Optimist league game are now in their 50's and 60's. There has been an unbroken stream of players, about 200-250, each year playing in the League.

A reunion is planned on Saturday, May 7, 2016, to celebrate the Club's founding, 50 years ago. It was chartered with 39 Members. It will be a time to look back and celebrate, but also to look forward, optimistically of course, to more basketball, more work, more serving the community and more ways of helping children.

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# TRANSITIONING FROM JOO



I become a Charter Member of my school's JOOI Club during my sophomore year of high school. However, I didn't become heavily involved until I was a junior and senior. I was Club President and Iowa District Secretary/ Treasurer my senior year. That vear. our Club arew in membership significantly, introduced a number of new projects, and continued to have a larger impact on the youth in our

community. Toward the end of the year. I had the opportunity to attend the Optimist International Convention in Cincinnati, a trip that sparked a much greater passion for Optimist than I had previously been able to find. It seemed like we went months with essentially zero progress. Finally, right before break in December, we had a faculty advisor in place and the membership required to use University resources. At that point, we were able to really start recruiting new Members and working towards chartering. We got to that point in the middle of the Spring semester, and ended up chartering with more than 50 Members, the largest new Club to charter in the organization's history.

I saw how difficult it was to get the Club started at lowa State, and how much "free time" it took away. I'm sure that if I had been approached about starting it without prior experience with Optimist, I would have guit in a week. It was the experiences that JOOI gave me that were the

inspiration to keep working. I've graduated from lowa State and have joined the Wayne (Corydon) Optimist *Club*, but the *lowa State Club* is strong and active and a true source of pride. The University owes a great deal of gratitude to JOOI for inspiring a group that is doing so much for the school and the Ames community.

# Sean Mueller

As a JOOI Member for seven years, I learned the importance of service towards others. Sadly, I had to graduate and leave JOOI, but I knew my service to the community had not ended. It was just getting started! On January 6, 2016, I was officially installed as an Optimist Member in my local Club. # THE CANADIAN CHILDREN'S OPTIMIST FOUNDATION

Mayah Abelman is "over the top excited" about the new all-inclusive playground at her school.

The Grade 5 student sped around in her wheelchair chatting with friends, teachers and EAs at the school's grand opening celebration of the playground Thursday afternoon.

Abelman is one of about 15 students at the school who have varving abilities or special sensory needs that make enjoying a traditional playground difficult. For her, the new rubber tile ground cover makes scooting around the playground a breeze. The play structures are spaced far apart, giving ample room for navigating classmates during a busy recess or lunch hour. It's a nice break from bumping over uneven grass and shifty sawdust, she said, where she's more likely to get stuck.

And then there's the playground. The swing is a large saucer, big and sturdy enough to lay down and stretch out in the sun or fly into the air. The old-fashioned, hand-spun carousel has been redesigned as a spinner. With child-friendly back rests and low-to-the-ground entry points, it looks more like a spinning pizza shell. Finally, right in the centre of the park, there's an open air hideaway for children to take a break from the action

The playground has taken almost two years to build, with a massive fundraising effort carried out by a team of nine parents on a special committee. Optimist Club of Chilliwack is proud to have been part of this fundraising effort.

Katrina Eng spoke on their behalf at the celebration, thanking the community and corporate sponsors for believing in the project. In total, the playground cost \$103,000, with a third of the cost going toward the special ground cover.

The accessibility is going to make a difference in the school, Eng said, but also for the community in general. Just around the corner is the Chilliwack Society for Community Living's Mathieson Centre, and kids from that program use the playground as well.

"That's a big part of why we brought this here," Eng said.

Their efforts began in September 2013, and included entering in an online Avitas contest. They won \$5,000 through votes from the community. They garnered support quickly and earned grants, fundraised with parent nights, and even entered a float into the Chilliwack Christmas Parade.

They had raised enough money to begin building earlier this March, completely replacing an older wooden structure, and adding to some previously purchased playground pieces.

There are now plenty of play areas to go around, and the students erupted in cheers on Thursday as the ribbon was cut.

"This is amazing," Abelman said, waiting her turn on the giant swing. "I love everything here."
