Leading Optimism into the Future



Very winning team is led by a strong head coach. The job of the head coach may seem simple, but without the proper support and direction even the strongest team can falter. Coaches plan, prepare and motivate their team to succeed. Optimists can be confident that the organization is being led by a solid leader focused on growth and new Club building in International President Jean-Claude St-Onge, also known as J.C.

His involvement with his local Optimist Club began the same way as a number of Members. J.C. was continually asked by his brother-in-law to join until he finally agreed in 1983. While he had numerous personal and professional commitments, he recalls that his family always placed an emphasis on community service and doing things for kids.

Early Days

J.C. was born in 1950 to a relatively poor family. His father worked for the railroad and the family moved quite often. At the age of six, the family settled in Dorion, Quebec, then later moved to a mining town where 99% of the community spoke English. Because of the remote location, the bus trip to school every day took 45 minutes and became an hour and a half in the winter. By grade 12, the trip had become 2 hours each way, making for very late night dinners. He graduated at age 15, but was too young to go to the university, so he took some additional science classes before starting college and majoring in business.

In 1966, J.C. began training in judo for five to six hours a day, and by 1972 was qualifying for the Canadian Olympic team. Unfortunately, a broken shoulder left him unable to compete, but he did serve as a trainer and learned the importance of that role.

After meeting Marcelle while working part-time for an electrical wholesaler, the two married in 1972. A few years later he was offered a full-time job and by 1975 was specifying lighting for the Olympic Village and part of Olympic Stadium in Montreal. Moving up to senior buyer and purchasing director for the eastern Quebec region, he began to learn the concept of teamwork.

Eventually, J.C. started his own business as an electrical manufacturer's representative, which forced him to be away from home on business three weeks out of the month. In four years, he grew the business from 3 to 10 employees. He is now semi-retired, but built a system that allows him to supervise his company from anywhere in the world.

The Importance of Family

J.C. and Marcelle have two daughters and one son. Their oldest daughter, Melanie is a full-time lawyer and mother of three- Anais(7), Emile(5) and Elliot(4) with her spouse Martin. Sandra is a visual concept supervisor, who has 2 daughters- Charlie (5) and Clara(2) with her spouse Mathieu. Their son Mathieu, also known as Matt has been working with his father for the past 10 years and will be manning operations while J.C. serves as International President.

"My wife and I are very proud of our children and 5 grandchildren." J.C. says.

Family is very important to J.C. and he credits his oldest daughter with helping him remember that.

"When I was Lieutenant Governor, my daughter was sixteen. She asked me if Optimists spend time with kids," J.C. recalls. "I told her yes and she asked when I was going to spend time with us, meaning her and her sister and brother. That was when I realized I must make equal time for my work, Optimism and my family."

Marcelle is not an Optimist Member, but is very involved in community service and caring for her mother, who is 97 years old. She has been taking English classes for the past year, so that she can communicate with Optimist Members. While she is nervous about making a mistake, J.C. says that "she loves people and they are naturally attracted to her."

Life as an Optimist

While J.C. may have initially been reluctant to join a Club, he quickly embraced the values of service. In 1985-86, he became a Distinguished Club President. He built an Alpha and a JOOI Club. Three years later, he became a Lieutenant Governor and organized Zone meetings every month. J.C. stressed the importance of communication to all of his Clubs.

"Optimism means fellowship, helping people and trying to find solutions for the youth in the community. It means working with all kids, not just the elite kids," J.C. says. "The best example is because of my job, I was able to get Mario Lemieux, a well-known hockey player to attend a Tri-Star event. The Club was able to provide 55 less fortunate kids with skates and hockey sticks. Kids still approach me to thank me for that experience."

His effectiveness at the Club and Zone levels led to him being asked to serve on District Committees, mainly Finance and Governance. J.C. developed a reputation as the "Club services guy" and was willing to assist wherever his talents could be best utilized.

In 1998, he was asked to serve on his first international committee. Since then he has served as New Club Building Chair, Finance Chair and on the Growth Panel. While he understands the importance of activities, his focus has always been more membership-based.

J.C. was honored to be asked to serve as a Vice President in 2000-01 and organized the first PDC in the Region that over 700 people attended. Following his term, he served on other international committees including Junior Golf. His straight-forward style to shoot from the

Showcasing Optimism with a Twist

The Fort Mill Community Optimist Club of South Carolina conducted their third annual "Tea with a Twist" fundraiser to bring the community together, promote Optimism and benefit youth.

A gathering of about 50 young people and adults were entertained by a mime group and a fashion show featuring Club Members. Attendees were served a wide variety of teas such as southern ice tea, hot peach, raspberry, green, chamomile and lemon. The proceeds from the event will help finance the Club's scholarship program for two deserving seniors, one from each of the two local high schools. The fundraiser also provides funding for the Club's "Fun Day in the Park,"



which involves a wide range of activities, food and the distribution of school supplies.

Attendees were entertained while learning about Optimism.

The "Tea with a Twist" event provided an enjoyable opportunity for the community to interact with the Optimist Club, while raising awareness of the work they do for local youth.

Going Green for Optimism

In honor of Earth Day, the Breakfast Optimist Club of Kalamazoo (BOCK) sponsored a latex paint recycling project. The Club partnered with e-Paint Recycling, a company that reconditions leftover latex paint for resale.

There were two designated drop-off locations for members of the community to turn in their paint. The cost was \$2.00 per can with no limits on how much or how little paint is left in the can. This leftover paint would be recycled into fresh new colors.

Community members were able to get rid of extra paint in an environmentally-conscious manner and BOCK was able to raise funds for projects that would benefit local children.

"The Club is proud of the lawyers and judges who were members of our Downtown Club that started this program 54 years ago. This is the oldest Club in Houston," said Club Secretary Bill Young. "Other former speakers at this occasion have been respected leaders of the city, county and state including President George H.W. Bush, Governor Rick Perry and the director of the FBI.

South Texas Governor Joe Smith closed the event by leading the honorees and guests in reciting the Optimist Creed.

Club Reaches Out to Children in Crisis

This was the second year the Club has been involved with the program and Members plan to continue contributing as part of their mission to be a friend of youth.

Supporting the Medical Professionals of Tomorrow

Members of the Winter Haven Optimist Club of North Florida had a unique opportunity to get a glimpse into the world of a surgeon. One of their Club meetings was conducted at the Winter Haven Hospital and hosted by Dr. Sijo Parekattil, the Director of Robotics/Medical Director of Urology and members of his staff.

After an informational presentation, Optimists were escorted to a surgical suite, where they put on gowns, slippers and hairnets. Each interested person was allowed to use the \$2 million da Vinci Surgical Robotic System to maneuver small micro-sized rubber bands and place them on even smaller obstacles underneath the robotic arms.

The hospital in conjunction with Polk State College initiated a student internship for high school juniors and seniors to attend an eight-week summer course in the "Scholarobotic Academy." Upon completion of the course, the student will receive three hours of college credit. The Winter Haven Optimist Club partnered with the hospital and college to provide financial aid to any interested student to meet the application fee for the course.

Past International President Donald E. Strub Passes Away

1982-83 Optimist International President Donald E. Strub died at his home in Springfield, Missouri, on August 4, 2012, at the age of 82.

Don Strub's Optimist service began in April of 1960, when he was asked to join the Optimist Club of Coralville, Iowa. "My sponsor was the Club President," Strub recalled, "and he kept persisting. So I told him I would join on one condition—that he didn't ask me to do anything."

In time, however, Strub was asked to serve and in 1965-66 was the Corallville Club's president. In 1968-69, he led the Iowa District as its Governor. His service on the International level began in 1970-71 as a member of the Membership & Attendance Committee. The following year he was elected to the office of International Vice President. He also was a member of the Achievement & Awards Committee (1972-73); Leadership Development Committee (1973-74); chair of that same committee (1974-76); member of the Candidate Qualifications Committee (1976-79); chair of the New Club Building Committee (1978-81); and International President-Elect in 1981-82. He was a member of the Breakfast Optimist Club of Springfield, Missouri, at the time of his death.

building more Clubs, nor solely to increase our programs of service to mankind," Strub wrote while President in 1982. "Our challenge is much greater than any one of these. Our challenge is to perpetuate the pride of this great organization and, yes, to elevate it even higher by excelling in all areas of endeavor."

Strub is survived by his wife, Jae, and their three children. The family requests memorials be made to the Optimist International Foundation.

Giving the Gift of Carino to Youth in Need

Members of the Garden City Optimist Club of St. Catharines in the Central Ontario District organized a service project to benefit the youth of the Resource Association for Teens (RAFT) in Niagara Falls. The Club created a memorable holiday for the teens by providing stockings, dinner and other donations. The Club was awarded the 2010-2011 Optimist Innovation Award in the Community Projects Award competition.

RAFT is a non-profit organization that serves young people without secure housing, many of whom lack financial resources or come from unstable homes, by providing support and a safety net for these at-risk youth. The organization relies solely on donations, including the one facilitated by the Garden City Optimist Club.

After selecting RAFT as the agency to sponsor for this first-time project, the Club had just a little over a month to complete the project. However, the short time frame "was a minor challenge as everyone pitched in, and teamwork did the job," said Club Members.

One of the goals for the project was to "to bring some joy and happiness into the teens' lives and make this Christmas one which they will remember," said Members. The Club brought this holiday joy to the youth in a personal way by arranging a Youth Night at the shelter where teens could decorate their own stockings.

The Club was able to fill these personally decorated stockings as well as provide the shelter with a Christmas dinner and much-needed winter clothing through an outpouring of support from donators. Member donations



funded the purchase of personal hygiene items to fill stockings, and a dental company and local dentists donated toothbrushes and toothpaste. A local store provided the Club with a 10% discount on anything purchased at their facility.

When a second-hand discount store provided garbage bags and boxes full of donated clothes, Optimist Judy Hagadorn said she was "overwhelmed" by the amount of the donation.

Delivery of all the donated items to the RAFT occurred in mid-December. This delivery also included items contributed by Members for the RAFT kitchen cupboard. The Club reported the donations were much more than expected.

"The most rewarding part was seeing the smiles on the youth when they helped us unload the vans in the snowstorm, which made us realize we made a difference to them," said Members of the Garden City Optimist Club.

The Club intends to continue the project in the future, and some Members plan to contribute to RAFT throughout the year as well.

University Students Focus on Helping Local Youth

The Montreal University Optimist Club decided to focus their efforts on providing youth with the opportunity to reach their full potential.

The Academic Support Project, a student initiative allows students to improve their skills through independent practice. Thirty youth, ages 6 to 17 from the Montreal Youth Center receive 30-minute individualized tutoring sessions twice a week. The sessions are aimed at overcoming their academic difficulties and helping them grow as students.

A partnership was established between their school, the youth center and the Club to identify each student's difficulties. Eight university students are working on this project from October through June.

The Club's Physical Education Project (PEP) takes place during the 8 weeks of summer break. The mission of PEP is to offer close to 500 youth the opportunity to be physically active and develop healthy life-long habits through a wide variety of sports and activities, from football and volleyball to yoga and kayaking. Ten university students work full-time on this activity during the summer.

The Club is dedicated to "bringing out the best in kids" through academics and healthy living.

#2 Websites

Social Media

Utilize resources like Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn. These are some of the best ways to connect with the 35 and under crowd. The best part is they are all free. Visit the social media page of the Optimist website for guides on how to utilize social media.

Do not discount the effectiveness of radio, television and newspaper in today's technology-based society. Send press releases and photos to local media outlets.

#7 Personal Stories

This can be incorporated into # 1, but think outside the box. Try filming 30-second video clips of Members telling why they are Optimists and posting them on the Club website and Facebook page.

Beet the Optimists

A Club could set up an informational table at a restaurant or grocery store. Invite people to ask questions and learn more about Optimism. The forum could be used as a way of inviting prospective Members to learn more about your Club without running a NOW meeting.

#6 Public Events

Make sure your Club is part of the community. Members should attend farmer's markets, state and county fairs, leadership classes and other local events. Potential Members should know that Optimists value their community.





Wear your Optimist pride on your sleeve...literally. It is an easy way to promote your Club, but it makes a strong statement. Members can wear t-shirts promoting the Club during your next project and then showcase their Optimism on any given day.

Sponsor a local sports team

Just imagine a team of little league players all wearing jerseys with your Club name and the Optimist logo. The team gets funding and your Club gets to showcase how they serve youth.



Consider working with another community-based group in a mutually beneficial relationship. Run a joint project so each group effectively markets the other.
